

Homeless With Baby Girls

In Des Moines lies a wooded area with barren trees, a winter breeze, and a frosted pond where two little girls emerge from a tattered tent. A dented metal lunch pail dangles from the hands of the three-year-old. As she bends down to add to her leaf collection kept inside, her parents watch, dreaming of the day they can escape the perils of homelessness and give their daughters more.

Johnny, 25, and Alexis, "Lexi," 23, met through mutual friends a couple of years ago. Johnny fell in love with Lexi right away and quickly bonded with Maisee, Lexi's three-year-old daughter. "Maisee is not biologically mine, but she's my daughter," he says. He worked to provide for them while Lexi was pregnant with their other daughter, Kennadi, who is now two years old. It was exciting to be expecting another child, but financial struggles engulfed them when Johnny lost his job as a subcontractor.

Johnny and Lexi found jobs at Pizza Hut, but their financial troubles kept mounting when Johnny's mother started her third battle with cancer. They both lost their jobs while caring for her.

They moved into an apartment owned by a slumlord with broken stairs and a barely working shower. Johnny and Lexi repeatedly asked for repairs, but the slumlord instead threatened them with eviction and eventually coerced them into taking \$350 to leave on their own as an alternative.

Johnny, Lexi, and their two young girls were now homeless.

"My biggest worry since losing permanent housing is losing my kids... DHS coming down here... taking my kids away from me.That's what I live with every day. It eats at me," Lexi said.

To be able to work consistently and escape the binds of homelessness, Johnny and Alexis list several difficult barriers: they need their driving licenses reinstated, reliable transportation and safe childcare – none of which they've

been able to secure without adequate finances. It's the same dilemma for most people experiencing homelessness: you need to have money to make money.

Johnny also battles depression, guilt and anger. Losing his dad suddenly when Johnny was seven caused a downward spiral. Even though he received professional help during his school years, his mental health struggles continue today

as he grieves not only the loss of his father but now also his mother. The love he has for his daughters is what keeps him motivated to work on his mental health.

"I've got these kids, and I'm trying to do whatever I can to pull myself up outta that hole," he says.

Joppa collaborated with Primary Healthcare to move Johnny, Alexis and their daughters into a family shelter. Joppa continues to help the family overcome their barriers including social security cards and jobs for both of them...Watch update.



JOPPA: A Model To Help Those In Need

It all began with a photo in the Des Moines
Register last winter. I recall seeing two volunteers
from a homeless resource center, Joppa, all bundled up,
walking down a snowy embankment to reach out to
unhoused folks in the greater Des Moines area. With
my comfortable life and focus mostly on national and
international issues, I wanted to find ways to get more
connected and involved with our own community. I was
moved and called Joppa to ask about volunteering.

Homeless folks in our community live in tents under tarps and bridges. In the winter, those with enclosed encampments may have portable heaters fueled by propane.

Soon after reading the article, my introduction to Joppa volunteering was at their Joppa Center on Euclid Avenue, where I joined a family cleaning and organizing items in a warehouse of sleeping bags, tents, propane heaters, surrounded by canned foods, and fresh foods ready for delivery.

My wife, Claire, and I started our monthly work after that, joining a host of volunteers on a Sunday afternoon, loading up our vehicles, now emblazoned with magnetic Joppa signs with the supplies to be shared with folks we met. Before each trip out, all the volunteers meet and are reminded of the mission to serve all with respect and kindness. Someone in the group offered to say a prayer, and we were off for the afternoon.

Using iPads, we follow a well-organized "route" of folks who have been entered into the Joppa mobile app with names and approximate locations of their encampments. We each have a role — all to be friendly and as helpful as we can to the folks we meet, taking turns handing out toilet paper, water, hot sandwiches, frozen foods, fresh foods, first aid supplies, hygiene supplies, and even mail delivered to the central office. When our Joppa vehicles pull up to the edge of the woods, we holler out, "Joppa!" to announce our arrival. I continue to be impressed with

the many people who come out of the woods to meet us and get their weekly supplies of sustenance. Each of us engages each person we meet — asking their names, if not known already, and asking them if they need anything else. A lot of needs are batteries, more propane for their heaters, and other items they might request.

And while Joppa describes itself as "faith-based," I find that volunteers I have met and worked with run the gamut from conservative to progressive, religious and political views. A pastor in training prayed with some of the homeless folks we met, but otherwise, religion was not mentioned in the field. Instead, we are all involved in the practice of putting our beliefs into action. I am impressed with how this and other efforts in our community in the areas of food banks, soup kitchens and disaster support are examples where partisanship is set aside.

This can be a model for our community and beyond to find common ground to help those in need.

I know we all see folks on street corners and highway exits with signs saying, "Any Amount Helps," and often "Homeless Veteran," among others. Before my work with Joppa, I would always wave or say hello to those folks on the corners. Now, if traffic allows, I offer water, which is always accepted, and share that I am a volunteer with Joppa, which brings out a smile, thanks, and recognition. I pass out Joppa cards that explain their services and hours. Many are already connected. As a gift to myself, I no longer feel uncomfortable just saying hello but can offer and be part of a community resource that helps save lives and provides options for those who are unhoused. Since its beginning 15 years ago, Joppa has helped nearly 600 individuals get off the street and into housing.
